These Centers give Ethiopian Jewish children the opportunity to overcome early educational inequality and participate fully in Israeli society. Named in memory of Elie Wiesel's younger sister, who died in Auschwitz, the Foundation currently runs two Centers, one in Ashkelon and one in Kiryat Malachi, which enroll more than 1,000 youth. The goal of these programs is to provide Ethiopian immigrants with desperately needed academic tutoring, pre-vocational training and social and emotional support.

THAT PLACE MUST—AT THAT MOMENT—BECOME THE CENTER OF THE UNIVERSE.




THE ELIE WIESEL PRIZE IN ETHICS ESSAY CONTEST

An annual competition for college juniors and seniors, this Contest is designed to challenge college students to analyze the urgent ethical issues confronting them in today's complex world. Students are encouraged to write thought-provoking personal essays that raise questions, single out issues and are rational arguments for ethical courses of action in addressing the complex issues of today.
